In Canada's vast Peace River region the mega-projects include a major new dam, tens of thousands of hydro-fracked shale gas wells, a nuclear power plant, and the Tar Sands.

On the positive side of the ledger, countless jobs are being created, resource revenues are pouring in, schools and hospitals are staying open. Alternatively,

there are credible charges that multi-national corporations are despoiling an area the size of Florida, converting public assets into private fortunes and leaving a wake of Mordor-like destruction. Who to believe?


In **Peace Out**, filmmaker Charles Wilkinson (*Down Here, Max*), assembles a brilliant cast of specialists who are credible, reasonable, occasionally irreverent, but always extraordinarily well informed on the subject.

Interviewees include:

- Internationally acclaimed academics.
- Politicians who write resource policy.
- Investment bankers whose capital lubricates the machinery of development.
- Corporate executives who believe in what they do, and want the rest of us to really understand.
- Resident activists trained by long years of fighting what has often been a losing battle.

Peace Out resists pointing a finger at the usual suspects. Instead it probes the deeper causes underlying the symptoms of environmental exploitation.

Director's Statement & Biofilmography

I was drawn to *Peace Out* by a long-time interest in the electrification of the continent, particularly the part of it I live in – Western Canada. The half dozen mega-dams built here 40 years ago are considered to have transformed the population from 'have-not' to 'have' status. It's true that the electric boom created a modern state with schools, hospitals and safe, pleasant communities. It also created some unintended consequences like displaced 1st Nations communities, diminished food supply, downstream devastation. More recently there has been an explosion in resource extraction activity in the North – which appears to be fuelling a tidal wave of private jets, Mc-Mansions and Porsche autos. And yet, an alarming chorus of concern over the costs of these activities is increasingly reaching the press and public discourse. Are dams green? Is shale gas fracking safe? Should we be considering a nuclear reactor in the wake of Fukushima? Are the Tar Sands really the dirtiest energy known to man?

I set out to try to find a few simple answers. What I saw & photographed up North both intrigued and alarmed me. I searched for people who could explain - fairly, reasonably & without bias what exactly is going on.

The people I finally included in the film are worth listening to. They turned many of my preconceptions on their heads. They made me understand that civil, informed discussion of these complex issues is pretty much the only way we could actually get serious about solving the urgent problems confronting us. I also found that the people normally considered to be 'the enemy' by the people I generally hang out with were mostly really thoughtful, engaged individuals – often just as freaked out by where this thing is headed as the most dedicated eco-warrior. And while I ending up disagreeing with the values some of the interviewees expressed, I realized that if we had smart people like these <u>inside</u> the tent instead of outside, imagine how possible the impossible things could get.

Peace Out took a long time to make – much longer than any of the other films I've directed. The process was exciting, exhausting, depressing, inspiring and ultimately, transformative. I do many things differently now. The film has changed me. I think it may have that effect on audiences as well. I hope it will. It's time.
